They were off the mark promptly and under way with four tries well saved by England's goal within the first few minutes and before the home team had settled down at all.

Miss Barrett scored first for the United States, and she, Miss Chadbourne, and Miss Keady, who went flat out to score their second goal, were the outstanding Americans in the first 25 minutes' play.
